




Instructions after Cystoscopy or Stent Removal

You have had a procedure called cystoscopy. This factsheet tells how to take care of yourself afterward.

The doctor used a tube with a lens at the end to look for problems inside your urethra and bladder. The urethra is the vessel that carries urine out of your body.

Some patients may have a tube called a stent that was put in earlier. The stent helped you urinate. For these patients, the doctor used cystoscopy to take out the stent.

Possible Side Effects

These things may happen after this procedure:

- Burning sensation when you pass urine. Hold a warm, moist cloth over the area after you urinate. This may happen for 1 or 2 days after the procedure.
- Urinating more often. This will usually last 1 or 2 days after the procedure.
- Small amount of blood in your urine. Your urine may have a slight red color for a few days after the procedure.

Do not worry if these things happen to you. If you have a lot of bleeding or pain, or if it lasts longer than the times above, call your care team. Your doctor may have taken a sample of your urine for a test that looks for cancer cells. It usually takes about 7 days to get the results. If 7 days have passed and you do not have the results, call 801-587-4379.

When to Call

If you have any of these problems, call the nurse line right away:

- A hard time passing urine
- Bright red blood in your urine
- Pain when passing urine
- Fever 100.4°F (38°C) or higher
- Chills
- Severe pain in the belly
- Nausea
